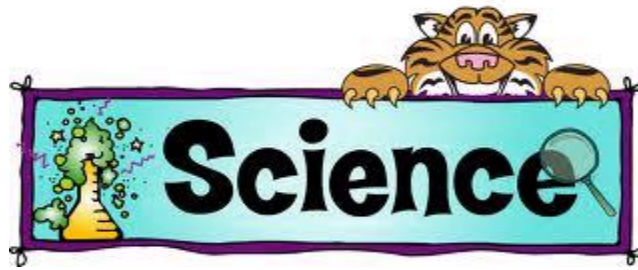

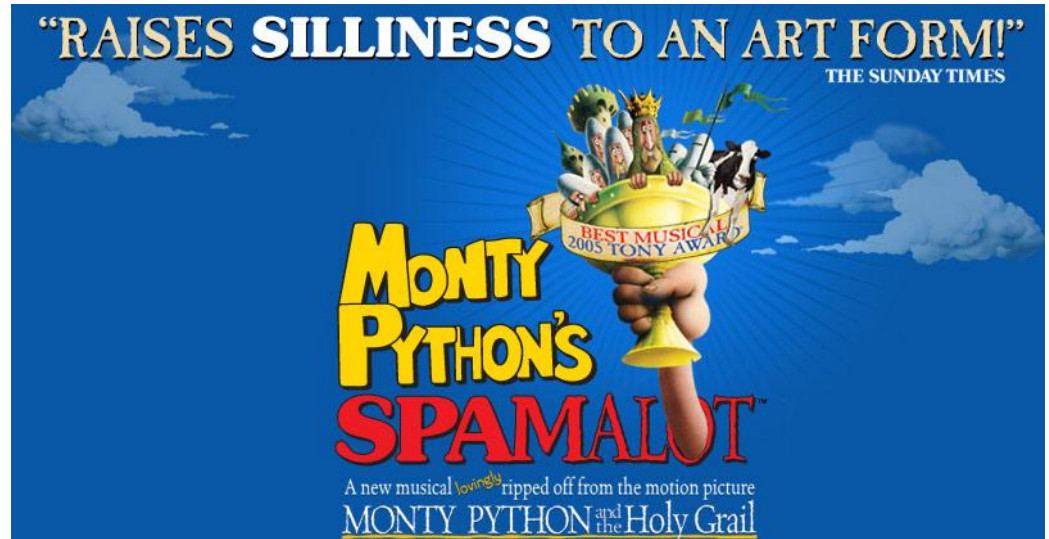

MS Workshop Presentation on Bullying

In an effort to increase awareness of the negative effects of bullying, fourteen students in the middle school performed a series of improvisations focused on situations when bullying occurs. This talented group of actors met on Saturdays throughout December and January to learn the basics of improvisation, and then collectively wrote and developed their scenes. Under the leadership of Margaret Hall, who works as Assistant Artistic director for Capital Rep. in Albany, and Kris Raskopf, Theatre Arts teacher at GCS, these students researched and examined this topical problem. Through theatre games and exercises, they put together a solid program for their peers. The presentation began with a filmed video of the students in different situations in the hallways, and was followed by some of the alarming statistics known about bullying. After this, students acted in improvised scenes, followed by a question and answer period with the student audience members. It is hoped that this type of presentation will raise student awareness of this problem and encourage students to take a stand against bullying. In the words of one of the players, "Please be the change you wish to see in the world."



All students in grades 6-8 viewed the presentation in February and it was one the most powerful presentations to students about bullying. The fourteen students also did an elementary version of the bullying presentation for students in grades 3 and 4.
